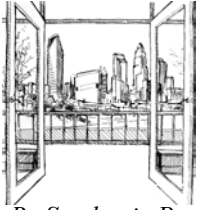

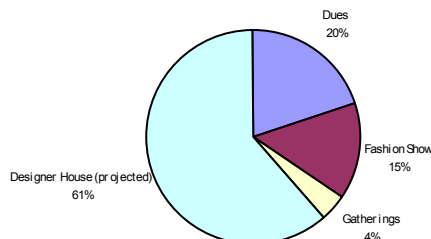

# Symphony Guild Income and Expenditures 2009-2010

The Symphony Guild's fiscal year ended on May 31, 2010, and the 2010 Designer House earned some very welcome income. Because there are still a few bills to be paid, we cannot yet report the Designer House earnings. However, we can give members a good idea of the sources of Guild income and how it was spent with some charts. The Symphony Guild's regular income consists of dues plus an amount designated as seed money for a fundraising project. This fundraising requirement for Active and Associate members has been a part of Guild finance since at least 1997. The remainder and by far the largest portion of The Guild's income must come from its fundraising projects. The Guild's object is to keep member dues low while raising a significant amount of money from the public for its enrichment projects and its annual gift to the Charlotte Symphony. The following chart shows the sources of The Guild's income in the fiscal year 2009-2010.

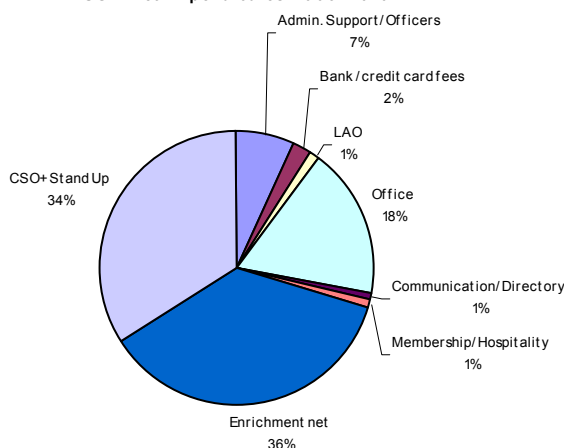
SGC Sources of Income 2009-2010



The Symphony Guild funds enrichment projects and gives money to the Charlotte Symphony each year in addition to providing many volunteer hours assisting in valuable but low-cost enrichment projects like the Musical Petting Zoo, youth symphony auditions, and school concerts. Higher cost enrichment projects include private study scholarships, need-based tuition assistance for some CSYO members, the Young Artists Competition, and Youth Festival. The Youth Festival is a costly program to produce, but until this year donations and ticket sales have covered the actual costs. This year those income sources did not quite meet the expense. The Symphony Guild earned for the CSO \$12,000 in its 2009 Stand Up For Your Symphony project. In addition, The Symphony Guild has recently given the CSO \$20,000 with the possibility of an additional amount this summer, depending upon the final results of the Designer House project.

Other expenses incurred by The Symphony Guild include maintaining its office and part-time employee, both of which save many hours and much money in areas such as printing and set-up costs. The Guild is, however, researching ways to decrease the cost of its office. There are other administrative costs involved in running the organization, including items like liability insurance, licenses, bank fees, credit card processing fees, rental of a storage unit, and costs incurred by its members in performing their duties. The following chart shows The Guild's expenses for the fiscal year 2009-2010. All expenses are net expenses, which means that in some areas like hospitality there is income that offsets part of the expenses.

The Designer House greatly increased The Guild's income for this fiscal year. The Designer House is a demanding project that has become difficult to produce annually; if The Guild does not sponsor a Designer House each year, it must find new and creative ways to earn money from the public. The Board has worked to reduce expenses, but it is even more important to raise its income. Most Guild members participated in the Designer House project this spring, and they should feel proud that they helped to make The Symphony Guild's year a successful one.

## Charlotte Symphony Youth Orchestras Celebrate 2009-2010 Season with Reunion Concert

The Charlotte Symphony Youth Orchestra hosted its first-ever reunion of former Youth Orchestra members. The two-day event began on Saturday, May 15, with the Hidden Freedom Festival at St. Luke's Lutheran Church, 3200 Park Road, and concluded Sunday, May 16, with a CSYO Spring Reunion Concert at the Central Piedmont Community College's Halton Theater.

Featured at the concert were the two Young Artists Competition Junior Grand Prize Winners—Juni Halston Lim, piano, and Maura Shawn Scanlin, violin.

The centerpiece of the entire weekend was the original orchestral composition, "Incidents in the Life of a

Slave Girl" composed by former CSYO violinist Ted Gellar. Ted is an active composer who is currently a Ph.D. candidate in classics at the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill. His composition is based on the famous slave narrative by Harriet Jacobs. Jessica McJunkins, former CSYO violinist, narrated. The remainder of the concert featured pieces by Bruch, Mendelssohn, Copeland, and an exciting side-by-side performance of Saint-Saëns' "Danse Bacchanale" with CSYO alumni. What a great example of the impact that involvement in youth orchestra and classical music can have and what a smashing finale to the season!

On Monday, May 3, the Junior Youth Orchestra ended

their season with a spring concert at Halton Theater at CPCC. The program included works by Mozart, Fauré, Sibelius, Bizet, Bach, Bruckner, Glière, Vaughan Williams and Saint-Saëns.

The next performance of the CSYO will be at this summer's camp at Converse College in Spartanburg, SC on Sunday, August 8, at 3:00 pm. Why not pack a picnic lunch and caravan down to hear the concert? Do not miss the wonderful music played by these talented young artists and help in our efforts to keep the music playing!

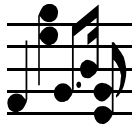
