This past summer, the Charlotte Symphony received a generous donation from the Wachovia Wells Fargo Foundation to fund their rebranding initiative. As part of that grant, The Guild was invited to join the process. Wray Ward, a Charlotte-based creative marketing and communications agency, was engaged for the task. Following sev-

eral months of study, a complete package of logos for the symphony family was created.

Throughout the process, The Guild's logo committee studied the transformation of the logos of major companies throughout the United States. Included were such firms as General Motors, Starbucks, and Coca Cola. In the past few years, many companies have redefined logos so that they had depth and character and could

be used easily in the ever-changing world of social media. Our committee considered these factors when selecting the final design.

As we go forward, The Guild will benefit from this fresh look while still maintaining the Horn imagery as an important link to our past. Over the next few months, you will see our new logo roll out on our website, invitations and communications.

from the desk of the President . . .



Usually the president writes a letter to the membership reviewing all of the events and the committees from the past few months. I am going to change that template today and instead address the membership about other concerns and points of interest.

First, I hope that you will be thrilled with the new logo for The Guild. Many hours went into the final design. The logo committee and The Board wanted to keep our horn but update it to a more contemporary look. You will notice that the font has also changed to give a cleaner and more readable line. I hope you will be as pleased as I am with the final result. Like anything that is new we will all have to 'get used to' the new logo. But the membership of The Guild is a fluid group, and I know you will embrace the new image we are trying to project.

Second, we need to discuss all of the many projects and efforts needed to keep The Guild functioning effectively. We are a relatively small organization, yet our endeavors are large. We fund the summer camp for the Charlotte Youth Symphony, support the Charlotte Symphony, and present the Musical Petting Zoo to hundreds of children and their parents each year. In addition to these areas, we conduct the Young Artists Competition, the Youth Festival, and a Master Class. To enable us to provide the many enrichment projects mentioned above, we have several fundraisers. Some of these are small and intimate; others are large and more formal. In order to raise the money needed, there is one main concern which we must take into consideration—the current lack of willingness on the part of the membership to accept leadership roles in the organization. Many of you are already engaged in various activities of The Guild. I appreciate your generosity. It was gratifying to have 81% of you volunteer for last year's Designer House. However, what we need now are more members willing to take leadership positions within The Guild. We have ideas for new and possibly very successful fundraisers, but we are without members to chair these events. We realize that these are large and sometimes imposing positions to accept, but without leaders we are unable to continue to fulfill our commitments and complete our projects.

I am asking you to look at your busy schedules and calendars and find room in them to take a leadership role within The Guild. We complete all of our endeavors in a team environment so nobody is 'out there' by themselves. Our team needs to increase if we are to get the job done. I promise that no volunteer will feel left in the lurch and that all of the Board will assist in any and all ways needed. It is my new year's resolution to encourage and inspire you, our membership, to broaden your activities within The Guild, especially in leadership positions. Please help us make The Guild the organization that it has aspired to become so that it can remain a viable asset in the community.

I have noticed that The Guild now offers PayPal as a payment option. I would love to avoid having to mail checks in every time I attend one of The Guild’s fabulous events. How do I access and use PayPal? Is it safe?

Dear Mara,

All Guild event information is located on our website www.symphonyguildcharlotte.org. Once you are on the website, there is typically a “buy tickets” or “donate” button to click if you are interested. This button takes you to a PayPal screen where you have the option of simply entering your credit card information and paying for your transaction, OR you can use your existing PayPal account, OR

you can open a PayPal account if you don’t already have one.

If you choose to create a PayPal account, every time you use PayPal to buy anything on the web, including Guild tickets, your transaction will be more streamlined and faster. Tech Goddess uses it for everything, and it is very secure!

Once you purchase tickets to an event via PayPal, you will automatically be registered for that event and tickets will be mailed to you if necessary. Enjoy!

been in Seagrove for many generations. Our first visit was to Sid Luck of Luck's Ware. He is a 5th generation potter who has been working at the same site all of his life. He now has a son and granddaughter to whom he is passing on the skills, techniques,



and talent. Sid talked about his history and at the same time, he made several pots. He also showed his kiln and explained how it is loaded and fired. The group really enjoyed looking around and



shopping before moving on to the next stop.

Next we visited Jugtown

Pottery where the group again had time to shop and look on while Travis Owen, a potter at Jugtown, explained his processes. Afterwards, we enjoyed the box lunches provided by The Cypress in Charlotte. The day was lovely and the group ate at picnic tables on the Pottery grounds. When lunch was over, Travis took us to look at one of the kilns he uses. After shopping,



everyone boarded the bus to travel to the studio of Ben Owens III.

Ben greeted the group and threw several pots on the wheel while describing his technique and the types of glazes he uses. Ben is a third generation potter. His grandfather is the famous Ben Owen. Ben's workplace is lovely, and he showed us many of the pieces he'd made. He also spoke of his commission work for the Ritz Carlton in Charlotte. Once again, we enjoyed visiting and shopping in his studio before boarding the bus to head back to Charlotte. Refreshments were served on the return trip. All on board really enjoyed what had been learned from the potters in Seagrove.
