


...The Charlotte Symphony Changes Its Look

New Assistant Conductor Jacomo Rafael Bairos Has a Passion for Arts Education

The Charlotte Symphony and new Music Director Christopher Warren-Green have welcomed new Assistant Conductor Jacomo Rafael Bairos to the CSO family this



fall. A native of Portugal raised in Miami, Jacomo studied tuba at the Interlochen Arts Academy and the Juilliard School before pursuing a Master of Music degree at the Cincinnati Conservatory of Music. He comes to Charlotte from Baltimore, where, at the invita-

tion of esteemed conductor and teacher Gustav Meier, he received a graduate performance degree in orchestral conducting from the Peabody Institute.

An energetic advocate for music education, Jacomo recently developed and conducted education concerts in Portugal and was named Music Director for the 2010 National Youth Orchestra Festival of Portugal. As Director of Orchestras for the Baltimore School for the Arts (BSFA), he created side-by-sides and education workshops for children in underserved urban communities. In addition, his recent posts in Baltimore include Director of

the Young Artists Orchestra of the Maryland Classic Youth Orchestra.

"I think that working with young people presents the ideal music-making situation," Jacomo says. "Kids are like blank canvases: They want to be inspired; they want to have fun. That's a big responsibility for me, to inspire them enough to love music and share music throughout their lives."

His zeal for sharing music with young people will serve him well in the upcoming season. As Assistant Conductor, he will conduct three of the four Lollipops family concerts, as well as the Debbie Phillips Classical Concerts for

Students. "The earlier we plant the seeds of classical music in kids and get them to understand how important it is to humanity, the better it is – for them, for the music industry, and for our community," he says.

"Jacomo will be an outstanding addition to the Charlotte Symphony conducting staff," said Christopher Warren-Green. "He is an excellent conductor and is passionate about community engagement, artistic collaboration, and the education of young people. I look forward to working with him."

CSYO Camp 2010 A Wonderful Week at Converse College

From August 4 through August 8, members of the Charlotte Symphony Youth Orchestra and staff convened at Converse College in Spartanburg, SC, for five days of musicianship and camaraderie.

Camp is an important part of the bonding process for the orchestra. It is the first opportunity for new



students to meet each other and allows the students to mesh and become an ensemble. The students lived together in dorms and shared meals and conversation in addition to important rehearsal time. On their last evening at camp, they performed in an informal recital, and afterwards were treated to a pizza party provided by the Parents Association. Camp culminated with a concert on Sunday, August 8.

This year's CSYO is lead by new Concertmaster Victoria Pan. This year's



program included Brahms's *Academic Festival Overture*, Grieg's *Norwegian Dances* and Bartok's *Ro-*

manian Dances. The "Scherzo" from Sibelius's



Symphony No. 1 nicely highlighted the strong woodwind section, while the strings and harp were featured in the "Adagietto" from Mahler's *Symphony No. 5*. Rimsky-Korsakov's *Russian Easter Festival* ended the performance.

During the concert Dr. Pereira commented that this is one of the youngest



youth orchestras in recent memory as there were many departing seniors last year. He commented on the difficulty of the repertoire and complimented the students on how far they had come since Day One of camp.

The students benefitted from the instruction of seasoned sectional coaches who are members of the Charlotte Symphony. For the strings, Dr. Pereira and Kathy Jarrell coached violins, Ning Zhao worked with violas, Matt Lavin with cellos, and Ian Bracchitta coached basses. Coaching woodwinds was Lori Tiberio, Dave Mills

worked with brasses, and Leo Soto instructed percussion. In addition, Chris D'Avanzo (horn), Ranya Davis (horn), Josh Carter (tuba), Elizabeth Honeyman (cello) and Loren Taylor (flute) served as camp counselors. CSYO manager, Chris Rydel, oversaw preparations for camp, and Liz Burns served as resident manager. Four parent chaperones helped make everything run smoothly.

Once again, the CSYO/JYO Parents Association took an active part and provided monetary support for the camp. We would like to extend our thanks to the parents for ensuring that youth orchestra members could attend camp at Converse College in order to work closely with Dr. Pereira, the coaches, and their fellow musicians.

On September 26, the CSYO was scheduled to appear at Festival in the Park performing some of the repertoire from Camp.



Unfortunately, rain cancelled the event at the last minute. For a short period of time, Guild members and CSO's Meg Whalen manned an information booth about Guild and youth orchestra events.
